To address the challenges and maximize the positive impact of sports, several recommendations can be made:

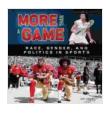
- Promote diversity and inclusion at all levels of sports, from participation to leadership.

Through continued dialogue, collaboration, and collective action, we can create a world where sports are truly open and accessible to all, regardless

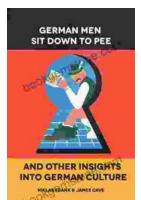
